By jointly investing in technology, workforce, and commercial-scale end-use within the region's industrial base, New Orleans can drive the nation's energy transition. EDA funding will support The Nexus Center, a central campus that connects the entire cluster ecosystem. The campus will coordinate a range of programming that advances regional economic competitiveness in the clean energy space while also centering equity as a core value (e.g., an inclusive entrepreneurship program; an HBCU New Energy Specialization to position students from the region's four Historically Black Colleges and Universities as hydrogen industry leaders in business, public policy, and law; and a workforce training and apprenticeship program). Other projects include investments for testbeds to improve hydrogen cost competitiveness, a development center for hydrogen-fueled ships, and a hydrogen fueling barge located at the Port of South Louisiana that serves as a clean fueling station for existing river vessels.
